Private William Anderson Ferrier

Sapper William Anderson FERRIER, son of David FERRIER and Jane Amelia CHEAPE, was born on 19 Jan 1893 in Leith, Edinburgh, Scotland. The circumstances have not been discovered but William embarked on his journey to Canada on Apr 29, 1905 with 102 children under the care of the Quarrier's Home for orphaned children. He was 12 at the time. He was later sent from the Quarrier's Home in Brockville to live with and work on the Howison farm near Pembroke, Ontario. He was still living in the household of William Kennedy **Howison** and his wife **Emma Fraser Davis** at the time of the 1911 census.¹

William Ferrier enlisted into the 21st Battalion, Canadian Infantry on Dec 29, 1914 at Kingston, Ontario. He was 21 years, 11 months and listed his occupation as farmer. He was described as 5' 6 1/2" tall and having a fair complexion, grey eyes, and reddish-brown hair. He arrived in England on May 15, 1915 and embarked for France on Sep 14, 1915. The following February, he was transferred to 3rd Tunnelling Company, Canadian Engineers on Feb 7, 1916.

Over the three years in the field, he attended health services a number of times for illnesses including influenza, bronchitis, and trench feet.²

Sapper William Anderson Ferrier died at age 25 years while performing his duties. The Circumstances of Death Register States: "Died (Accidental Injuries)

> He was working on dugout at Kemmelhof and while engaged at the face at 7 am, Jun 21, 1918 was buried by the breakaway set collapsing. He died before he could be dug

His next of kin was listed as his Uncle William Ferrier in Leith, Scotland, so one would expect that he had some communication with family in his homeland.³,

He was buried in the nearby Royal West Surrey Cemetery that same day. In early January 1922 his remains were exhumed when that cemetery was emptied and reburied in the Bertenacre Military Cemetery, Fletre, Nord-Pas-de-Calais, France. 2,4,5,6

His sacrifice is also commemorated on the Greenwood Methodist Church Memorial Tablet.⁷

Private Wm. Ferrier, who was one of the Pembroke company of the 21st Battalion, has been killed in action. He had been nine years in this country, having come from Leith, Scotland, and during that time lived at the home of W. K. Howison in Pembroke township. His age was 24 Jears.

The Perth Courier published a heart wrenching letter addressed to W.K. Howison from Spr. William Ferrier's Captain.8

W. A. Ferrier. The letter was sent to Mr. W. K. Howison, who lives on the Westmeath rond a few miles from Pembroke and with whom the young man resided before going overseas.

His comrades worked like desper-

ate men to rescue their chum, for he was greatly loved by all. They work-ed also in constant danger of another

ed also in constant danger of another cave that would bury them.

Spr. Ferrier was conscious to the last, and inch by inch the water kept rising. It was a scene of peculiar sorrow, and the strong men worked while weeping bitter tears that they could not resque their pal. At last his voice came low and unquivering, "Well, good-bye, boye, I'm going to leave you, and all was still. After a while the body was recovered and we buried Spr. Ferrier on the hillside nearby, in a lovely country still unwe burled Spr. Fetrier on the hillsdu-nearby, in a lovely country still un-desolated by the war. He, too was counted worthy to give his life for the world's liberties. Our unit is er-ecting a cross over your hephew's grave and his comrades have approa-ched me to get a wreath at their ex-bense.

am sure that they all, with me, wish to express their deepest sympa-thy with those who metera Spr. Fer-rier's loss.

UNVEILING OF MEMORIAL TABLET

"Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends." With this thought in view the Methodist Church at Greenwood was packed on Sunday evening, Sept. 19th, when a Memorial Service was held to the Memory of five heroes who made the supreme sacrifice in the Great War. A beautiful Memorial Tablet had been erected in the Church and on Sunday evening reverence was paid to the sacred memory of these five heroes. With Rev. Chas. B. McLauchlan as chairman the evening service opened with the singing of the National Anthem. This was followed by devotional exercises. Mrs. Seabrook rendered a beautiful solo aud an eloquent address was delivered by Rev. E. D. Mitchell of Cobden. A quartette preceded addresses by Col. Irving and Sen. White. These were listened to with intense interest. Col. Mackie performed the ceremouy of unveiling the tablet on which were inscribed the names:

James Dickson, Somme 1916.

S. James Paterson, Somme, 1917.

W. A. Ferrier, Hill 60, 1918.

Frank Sutton, Cambrai, 1918.

W. Forbes Ferzier, Cambrai, 1918.

While the congregation stood in reverence the bugler sounded "Last Post." It was a most impressive ceremony and will long be remembered by the Great sacrifice they had made in the Great War.
