Private Walter Johnson

Pte. Walter Johnson, son of **Walter Johnston** and **Annie Crothers**, was born on 25 Dec 1883 in Johnstone, Renfrewshire, Scotland. The spelling of his surname is noted as "Johnson" in his military records however his siblings and parents' surname is spelled "Johnston" in records that I have located. A number of his siblings immigrated to Canada including his brothers Joseph of Pembroke and Matthew of North Bay, and his sister Alice (Mrs. Wm A. Dack) of Cobden. Walter's occupation was listed as plasterer² however for a period of time he worked in Dack's General Store in Cobden as a clerk.

Pte. Johnson enlisted into the 18th Battalion of the Canadian Infantry (Western Ontario Regiment) on Sep 2, 1915 in London, Ontario where he was living at the time.² He is described as being 5' 7" and 130 lbs. He had grey eyes and auburn hair.² He was 31 years, 9 months old. His beneficiary was his brother Joseph.

Pte. Johnson sailed for Liverpool from Halifax aboard S.S. Lapland on April 26, 1916. On Sept 9, 1916, he joined the unit in the field. Less than a month later, he was killed 'in action' on 3 Oct 1916 near Courcelette, France aged 32 years, 10 months old.³ The circumstances of death register³ stated only:

"Killed Action" Vicinity of Courcelette.

Twenty-six members of the 18th Battalion were lost on Oct 3, 1916. His body was not recovered but his name is marked on the Vimy Memorial at Vimy, Pas de Calais, France.^{4,5,6,7}

Pte. Walter Johnson's name is commemorated on the original Memorial Hall plaque dedicated to the Cobden & Area soldiers who died in WWI and the Cobden Legion's WWI Cobden

Honor Roll⁹.

Pte. Johnson's brother received the medals he had earned – Victory Medal, British War Medal as will as the Memorial Cross.

Mrs. W. A. Dack received the sad news on Friday of last week that her brother. Walter Johnston, had been killed in action. Mr. Johnston for a time was clerk with W. A. Dack, but moved to Lendon, Ont., where he enlisted on September 2nd, 1915. He was killed in action on October 2nd, 1916. He is survived by three sisters and two brothers. Our sympathy is extended
